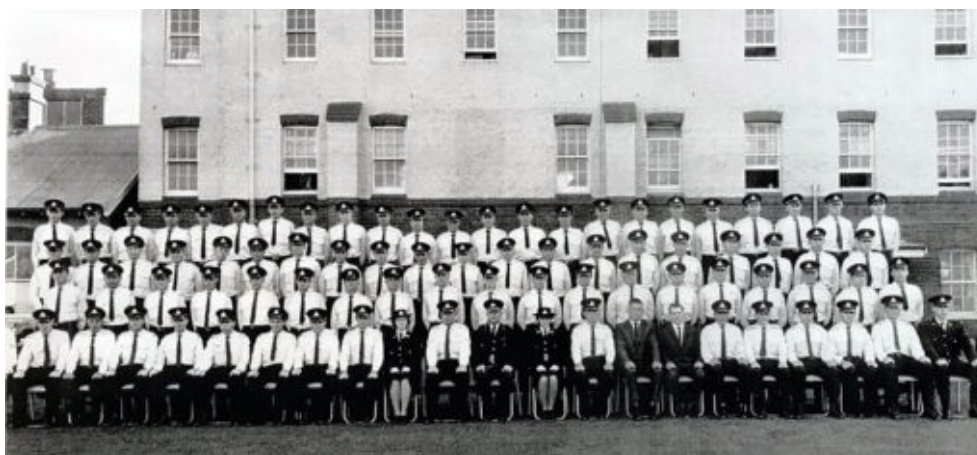

Olympics chiefs consult with activists

Reporter: Rafael Epstein

COMPERE: Already, the organisers in Sydney are studying today's events at the World Trade Organisation protests in Seattle. The organisers concede it would be possible for demonstrators to disrupt access to Olympic venues next year. However Superintendent Terry Lester from Olympic security command says alternative routes have already been planned. And Superintendent Lester has been telling Raphael Epstein police are already consulting with political and activist groups liaising so there's advance notice of demonstrations.

TERRY LESTER: Well, during Games time we obviously plan for these sort of incidents happening – not only demonstrations, but also car crashes and other incidents that may block the

Olympic lanes or the CBD or other areas where a lot of people are trying to get to and from Olympic venues. Now, the way we do this is we've got the Olympic routes already planned out. As secondary to those, we've got another lot of Olympic routes where, if the first one becomes blocked, we use the alternate. We're also trying to get people to speak to us before they demonstrate so that they can get their message across. It's important for them to get their message across to the media, to the rest of the world, if you like, and it's important that they do have their say.

RAPHAEL EPSTEIN: But Sydney's already a, should we say, difficult city, traffic-wise and transport-wise. It would potentially be quite easy for them to block off the major roads leading to Olympic sites, wouldn't it, with a couple of thousand demonstrators.

TERRY LESTER: Oh yes. And we recognise what's happening in Seattle at the moment as to these limited number of demonstrators and effectively slowing up a major event. But working with ORTA and the RTA and the local councils, we're trying to say to these people 'you've got the right to demonstrate, we recognise that, but we've also got to keep the Games going at the same time'. So we're trying to provide an alternative system, if you like, so that if one – one system does become blocked up, the alternative is there and it's readily available to us.

RAPHAEL EPSTEIN: So if a group of demonstrators then is uncooperative, you're going to have to rely on those back-up routes to get people into venues.

TERRY LESTER: Yes, that's correct.

RAPHAEL EPSTEIN: How far advanced are preparations for those alternative routes?

TERRY LESTER: Oh, very much advanced. We've already, with ORTA, released to the public the Olympic routes where people

are going – major routes which are travelling to and from the various venues around the city. There's 11 of those. And we've already got secondary routes already planned out and identified – which ones – the ones that we are going to use.

RAPHAEL EPSTEIN: Would you need special powers at all to, I guess, disperse demonstrators if they are causing a real problem, if they do manage to block off all of the routes into a venue?

TERRY LESTER: No. We can use the current legislation that we already have for people causing an unreasonable obstruction – things like that, you know. And how we clear up demonstrations now is the way which we'll do it during the Games.

RAPHAEL EPSTEIN: What do you think of the fact that tear-gas was used in Seattle this morning on the demonstrators?

TERRY LESTER: Oh, I'd rather not comment on that. I wasn't even aware of that problem in the first place, you know. And how people police in Seattle may be totally different to the way we police here.

RAPHAEL EPSTEIN: Do you know if tear-gas has ever been used on demonstrators in Australia?

TERRY LESTER: No, I'm not aware of that. Obviously we've got the capsicum sprays which come out. But that's in a reasonable life-threatening situation where enabled to use that.

You know, Australian society – the Olympic Games, you know, are melding well together. And what we're trying to do here – it's a friendly, open sort of a Games. But I don't think we're going to have serious-type demonstrations like they're having in Seattle or with the MUA.

COMPERE: Superintendent Terry Lester is with the Olympic Security Command. He was speaking with Raphael Epstein.

Ted joined the Cadets on 3 March 1952 and served at Regent Street and the M0 Section. He was called to National Service training at Ingleburn during that year and was sworn in as a Probationary Constable on 26 March 1953.

His early service saw him at Regent Street, the Vice Squad, Burwood and Ashfield. In 1954 the School Lecturing Section occupied his energies where he remained for the next 17 years. By this time he had reached the rank of Sergeant and was transferred back to general duties at Granville and Merrylands. Cabramatta was his next port of call where 12 police officers attempted to keep law and order for 48,000 people. Whilst at Cabramatta, he was promoted to Sergeant 2nd Class and transferred to Campbelltown where he remained for ten months.

He was successful in securing a posting to Bowral as Officer in Charge, and after 2 years was promoted to Sergeant 1st Class. Mudgee was next in line where he saw service for another four years and held office in 14 community organisations and was President of Rotary International.

In 1984 Ted returned to Sydney pending promotion to Inspector

where he saw service at Petersham, Campsie, Balmain and Ashfield, retiring from Ashfield aged 55.

Retirement did not suit Ted, and for 2 years he occupied himself by assisting ailing business companies as a management consultant. After that time, he retired again. But it was not long before he was back at work. This time with the Salvation Army, not as a box-shaker as his brother thought, but as a human resources consultant, getting people over 40 back into work through the Mature Workers' Program. This was the zenith of his working career as he was the most successful consultant in the country, securing over 3,500 placements. Such was his success that when he retired in 2000, all tiers of government recognised his achievements.

Federal and State Governments recorded his achievements in Hansard, and Local Government gave a civic reception to mark his retirement. Other recognitions were: the Pride of Workmanship Award by Rotary International; Certificate of Appreciation by the Salvation Army (only one other non-Salvationist has received the award); the Older Person of the Year Award, presented by the Commonwealth Government. In 2002, Ted was awarded an **Order of Australia Medal** for Services to the Community. This included being a Scoutmaster, President of the Parents and Citizens Associations at various schools, working for the Royal Childrens' Far West Scheme as well as his career achievements.

Ted has always recognised the advantages of knowledge and spent 22 years studying part-time at various universities and has numerous tertiary qualifications. During his police service, he encouraged others to seek greater knowledge and aspire to achieve. He supervised Ken Moroney, Christine Nixon, Jacqueline Milledge and many others who have made their mark in the community.

25 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

From the Principal, NSW Police College

On 20 July 1984, the NSW Police Academy (as it was then called) was officially opened in Goulburn by the Minister for Police & Emergency Services, the Hon Peter Anderson MP, Commissioner of Police Cecil Abbott AO, QPM and the Principal of the NSW Police Academy, Executive Ch Supt Ron Wark.

Although there was a period of transition between the NSW Police Force establishing at the site and the Riverina College of Advanced Education departing, policing students were in residence from May 1984.

As a result, the official opening occurred during the first attestation parade to be held at the Academy on Friday, 20 July 1984, when 96 probationary constables who had been in residence at the Academy attested.

Since those early beginnings, the NSW Police College has become an integral part of the Goulburn community. For many hundreds of staff attached to the College since its opening, Goulburn has become their home, a place where their children have grown up. A place where College families have contributed to the broader social, economic, religious, cultural and sporting activities throughout the city.

It is also a place where many thousands of currently serving and retired NSW police officers have spent various periods of their career in residence either preparing for their entry into the NSW Police Force as probationary constables, supporting the college on secondment or other duties, or undertaking in-service training to become detectives, highway patrol officers, intelligence officers, supervisors, commanders, or assume one of the broad specialist roles required in policing. While at the College, students over the years have raised and contributed tens of thousands of dollars for worthy causes including national and local charities, and special need causes.

Since 1984 the College has undertaken considerable development in its teaching and accommodation facilities, and staffing numbers have increased proportionately.

Later this year, a new virtual training firearm simulator complex will be opened, providing leading-edge technology and improved safety for students undertaking weapon training. The opening of the complex will be a further addition to the original buildings, and join enhancements such as the teaching facilities, residential accommodation, scenario village, sim venue, driver training and push-bike training complexes.

While the additional resources have resulted in a world-class police training facility, its role as an education and training provider to meet the needs of the NSW Police Force has never changed.

Indeed, in recent years, record numbers of policing recruits have been prepared for attestation as probationary constables. At times, this has required the community of Goulburn to open up its doors to accommodate students, and many who participated have maintained personal friendships with students since.

The largest attestation parade in the history of the NSW Police Force occurred at Goulburn on 30 January 2007, when 799 probationary constables attested. The preparation for policing of thousands of probationary constables since the College's opening will always be linked to the City of Goulburn.

As Principal, and in the year of the College's 25th anniversary, the greatest recognition



I can give is to the staff of the NSW Police College, both past and present. Whether as sworn members or as support staff, each and every one has contributed to the significant achievements and worldwide recognition that continues to grow.

Over the years, the College has been called on to do extraordinary things, and each and every member of College staff has responded accordingly.

The quality of police education and training in this state, and the College's growing reputation, reflects highly on the dedication and commitment of all staff who have worked, and continue to work, at the College. To each of them, for their individual and corporate contribution to the College and the wider Goulburn community, I owe my personal gratitude.
